The primary vision of the Bay Youth Summer Work Foundation is to help improve the quality of life and increase the success of high school students. The foundation will form a lasting relationship between the civic/ business community will allow them to take stock in the development of the youth in the Bay County and surrounding counties. Additionally, our vision is to raise the level of career aptitude goals; spur goals of high achievement in the student population with goals to reduce juvenile truancy and enhance their capacity to develop a healthy career out-look prior to high school graduation. The Bay Summer Youth Work Foundation is committed to the needs of the community by serving as a venue to provide valuable skills and work ethics in a business partnership relationship connecting our students to a real- time work environment which in turn will prepare students for future occupations and career choices. Additionally, the Bay youth Summer Work Foundation will provide education training via workshops to improve skills in knowledge of the various occupation available that does not require a post-secondary college degree. Workshops will provide added alternative pathways for students to excel. Through association with various local business over the course of their employment weeks. This is a first-of-its-kind, summer partnership that will allow business to grow young men and women in the local area and enhance the overall success rate in community upward mobility.

Over the last 3 years, the Willie Pollard Insurance Agency has used private funds to increase the opportunity for several young men and women with valuable work experience in customer related insurance service profession. On a large scale, the Bay Youth Summer Work foundation will have the capability to reach many more students. Bay Youth Summer Work Foundation Incorporated, as part of Neighborhood of Good, will be providing 30- 40 students part- time summer work, this will greatly enhance the household that are impacted by the economic conditions existing in Bay County. This will be a winner, for (Learning, Income support and Family Transformation) additionally, approximately 61 percent of the households in Bay County for families size of four lives below the nation poverty level in earned annual income.

Workshops will provide added alternative pathways for students to excel. Through association with various local business over the course of their employment weeks. This is a first-of-its-kind, summer partnership that will allow business to grow young men and women in the local area and enhance the overall success rate in community upward mobility. The long term agenda will enhance the level of financial and economic literacy of individual students and to promote career development at the early stages based on career aptitudes prior to graduation, if post-secondary education is not in the students' long range career goals. The transformation Impact will be immense as the focus is on keeping students in summer employment and ensuring they have a well-rounded hands on experience into various job markets.

Statically data will be maintained in personnel files vital to student's success, additional budgeting supporting administration cost of the program to extend to a year-round operations. Emergency support to help students with extraordinary economics necessities, funding students' academic tutoring service if needed at a cost from the local community. Funding will be required to establish and offer financial literacy programming for students.

The Bay Youth Summer Work foundation also will help in increasing student's awareness of the Technical industrial opportunity that exists in Bay County. It will serve as conduit to Haney Technical Center as it provides support to students and provide counsel in career profiles and help to overcome educational hurdles.

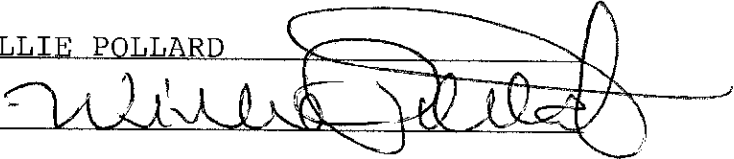

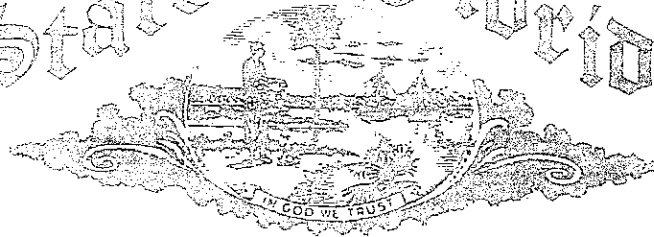
