Brief Description of Individual/Entity/Organization:

Gulf Coast State College (GCSC) was founded in 1957 to serve the educational, economic and community needs of GCSC District Impact Area (DIA) formed by the Gulf, Franklin and Bay counties. The College offers a wide variety of traditional, online and combined academic programs at the college's four campuses; 1) The Panama City Main Campus; 2) Tyndall Air Force Base Education Center, 3) North Bay Campus and the Emergency Operation Center, and 4) Gulf/Franklin Campus.

Initial population estimates for the summer of 2018 for the District Impact Area (DIA) indicated there were 211,000 residents, over 15% of all residents were below poverty level, the per capita average median income was \$21,915, and 15% of the minorities living in the area were significantly below poverty (U.S. Census Population Estimates July 1st, 2018). The Fall 2017 enrollment was close to 6,000 students and our student body profile was as follows: 33% registered full time, 60% are females, 17% are minorities, 55% are 21 years of age, and 46% received a Pell grant while 17.6% were granted a loan.

REQUIRED EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Gulf Franklin Campus (GFC) of Gulf Coast State College in Port St Joe is requesting funding to expand the number of students who can be served in the nursing programs offered at the campus. The funding would be used to expand the capacity of the campus in order to increase enrollment in the Practical Nursing (PN), LPN to ADN Bridge, and Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) programs.

This increase in capacity would be accomplished by the creation of a nursing simulation center using the newest and most effective simulation equipment, technology, and trained faculty. The creation of the Nursing Simulation Center (NSC) at the GFC would enable the nursing students to perform clinical training on site at the GFC. Historically, the barrier to expanding the nursing programs at the GFC has been a shortage of clinical sites. The creation of the NSC at the GFC will result in enrollment increases below:

<u>Practical Nursing</u>: The creation of the Nursing Simulation Center (NSC) would allow nursing students to perform clinical training on site at the GFC which would enable the PN program to offer two start dates a year, rather than one. This would double the enrollment potential from **36 to 72 each year**.

<u>Certified Nursing Assistant Program (CNA)</u>: The NSC would permit the CNA skills training to be offered twice weekly, decreasing the time to complete the program from 15 weeks to 8 weeks. The shortened CNA program could then be offered at least three times per year, increasing enrollment from the usual maximum of **12 students to 36**. Additional classes could be offered based on community need.

LPN-ADN Bridge Program: The LPN-ADN Program is offered as a weekend option at the GFC and currently has a maximum of 18 students enrolled each semester. With the creation of the NSC, the program can accept 22 students each semester, increasing the yearly enrollment from **36 to 44**.

As a result of the creation of the Nursing Simulation Center at the GFC, enrollment would increase from the current 84 students to 152 students per year or **68** additional students. Over the 5-year scope of this request, **the total increase in nursing students would be 340 students**.

Historically, the employment placement rate for the nursing programs at the GFC is 90%. Given this placement rate, over the 5-year scope of the project, 306 new nurses would be employed in the local communities served by the GFC. The availability of 306 new nurses in the area would have a significant impact on the nursing shortage in the local areas and a significant fiscal impact on local economies.

In addition to the ability to increase nursing program enrollments at the GFC, the NSC would also be available to health providers, such as: Sacred Heart Hospital on the Gulf, Weems Hospital, Cross Shores Care Center, and other health care centers used to train new hires and test skill competency levels.

Anticipated Match: \$100,000 in kind - While the exact amount and sources for additional funding to support this project are not yet confirmed, efforts will be taken to apply for local foundation grants to support the NSC and to seek other funding/resources from partners in the local communities.

Economic/Transformational Impact - The NSC at the GFC will increase the enrollment in the nursing programs by a projected 340 students over 5 years. Given a 90% placement rate, it is anticipated that 306 new nurses will be employed as either RNs, LPNs, or CNAs in the local communities.

The average starting salary for RNs in the local area is \$56,480, while LPNs start at \$37,700 and CNAs start at \$25,930. The per capita income in Gulf County is \$21,005 and the per capita income in Franklin County is \$23,524. In each case, the starting salaries for the graduates of the nursing programs at the GFC will be higher than the per capita income for the area and significantly higher for RNs and LPNs. This increase in trained nurses earning salaries from \$4,000 to \$35,000 higher than the per capita incomes in the local area will have a significant economic impact on these individuals and their communities.
