1. Title: Santa Rosa Industrial Park East

2. **Description:** This project proposes to construct approximately 1.5 miles of roadway and utility infrastructure at SRIP East to accommodate the expansion of three manufacturing companies. The 120-acre industrial site is currently inaccessible to potential tenants.

Competition for this project includes the ready sites available just across state lines, and without the necessary infrastructure in place for these companies to expand, these jobs will be lost to our neighboring states.

Approximate Project Parameters

- **Number of Jobs: 110**
- **Average Wage: \$41,770**
- **Capital Investment: \$22 million**

3. **Location:** Santa Rosa Industrial Park East is located off of Jeff Ates Road in the unincorporated area of central Santa Rosa County. Parcel id# 28-2N-27-0000-00500-0000.

4. How the proposed project promotes economic recovery, diversification and enhancement of the disproportionately affected counties:

- (a) **Economic Recovery:** The Santa Rosa Board of County Commissioners has worked for years to bring higher paying jobs to the County. One of the most telling statistics of the county can be seen on the Northwest Florida FORWARD County Snapshots. The net inflow/outflow of commuters is largely outward from Santa Rosa County, which means workers are commuting outside the county to higher paying jobs. They are commuting to the metropolitan core areas of Pensacola or Fort Walton Beach or to Crestview. The downturn of the economy in 2008 and the Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill in 2010 both hit the county's economy very hard (unemployment rose from 2.8 in 2006 to 9.5 in 2010) because of the reliance on growth in the construction/housing industry and tourism for jobs and revenues.

Years later, the choice among better paying jobs in the county is still limited. As of 2016 according to the Northwest Florida Forward County Snapshots, a publication of Florida's Great Northwest, the top five industry sectors by employment are, in order, elementary and secondary schools, limited service restaurants, full-service restaurants, the federal government including military, and local government.

- (b) **Diversification:** Santa Rosa County has relied heavily upon military, tourism and agriculture, all of which are subject to unpredicted devastating events that can wipe out expected revenues, such as the Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill, weather conditions and base realignments. Development of the manufacturing industry will not only diversify the economy but would also provide stability.

- (c) Enhancement of Disproportionately Affected Counties: Santa Rosa County and the region of disproportionately affected counties will be enhanced:
 - i. The COVID-19 pandemic has brought a renewed attention to US manufacturing and supply chains. Strengthening the manufacturing industry in Santa Rosa County will benefit all of NW FL.
 - ii. Manufacturing helps create jobs not only for the individuals who are manufacturing the components and products, but for those who are selling them, distributing them, and using them in other technologies.
 - iii. Will create net new jobs in support of a targeted industry.
 - iv. Because manufacturing has so many substantial links with so many other sectors throughout the economy, its output stimulates more economic activity than other sectors.

- 5. **Proposed Timeline:** The three manufacturing companies are looking to break ground as soon as possible. To meet this demand, Santa Rosa County EDO has invested \$136,149 to bring the project to 60% design. The remaining design would be completed immediately upon award, with construction to follow after. Construction is anticipated to last approximately 18 months.
- 6. **Disproportionately affected counties impacted by the proposed project:** Due to the strategic location along Highway 90 in Santa Rosa County, job creation will include workforce from Escambia, Santa Rosa, and Okaloosa Counties – all of which are within a 30 minute drive time.
